### BOSSINEY METHODIST CHAPEL

The Chapel is celebrating 150 years of worship at Bossiney. It was built as a Bible Christian Chapel in 1860, a movement founded by William Bryant. In 1907 the Chapel joined the United Methodist Free Church and with mainstream Methodism in 1932. It continues to witness to the hamlet of Bossiney and surrounding area in 2010.

The celebrations on the 20<sup>th</sup> June 2010 will commence with Morning Service at 11.00 a.m. Special Speaker Dr. Michael Burnett, a passed Sunday scholar. In the field next to the Chapel there will be a large marquee where in the afternoon local children will be invited to the "Party at the Mound". At 6.00 p.m. Evening Worship will be in the marquee led by the Rev. Steve Wild and the Callington Gospel Choir followed by a supper.

### NEWS FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR GLENTON BROWN

Cornwall Council's successful bid for government funding for secondary education. Cornwall Council has been more successful in its latest bid for government funding. It would appear there could be possibly up to five hundred million coming to the County to ensure that every secondary school in Cornwall gets a re-fit. There are thirty one secondary schools which should be involved in this improvement scheme and the funding will come under the government's building schools for the future.

The work will be carried out in six stages so that after the thirty one most pressing claims for improvement the work can then continue through to the other secondary schools.

A reminder to all parishioners – if you see anyone who does not clear up after their dog, please report the details to Debbie Attwell, Cornwall Council Street Ranger on 07768 775928 or the Parish Clerk, Sue Moth. Cornwall Council Street Wardens and the local Police Community Support Officers can issue Fixed Penalty Notices to people who do not clean up after their dogs.

The Cornwall Council Dog Warden attended the March meeting of the Parish Council and advised that The Fouling of Land by Dogs (Cornwall) Order 01/201 states that offences can be committed on “all land which is open to the air and to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access, with or without pavement, within the County of Cornwall other than land which is placed at the disposal of the Forestry Commissioners”.

## **A CONTRIBUTION FROM TREVENA TINTAGEL W.I.**

The Women of Trevena Tintagel W.I. would like to congratulate you on the production of the Tintagel Parish Council Newsletter. We found it interesting and informative.

We note that you are keen to receive contributions from all sectors of our community and wondered if you would be interested in the W.I. submitting a piece once or twice a year to inform people of what we have been up to and what we hope to get up to in the future.

For example, do people know how unusual it is for a W.I. to own its own hall? Recent research has shown that, contrary to popular belief, our hall was not gifted to the W.I. but bought by Tintagel W.I. in 1923. (Tintagel W.I. and Trevena W.I. enlarged to become Trevena Tintagel W.I. in 2000) As all property owners know, buildings need a lot of attention and money and can soon fall into disrepair without both of these.

Thanks to the tenacity and extreme hard work of a few of our members and their partners the W.I. was successful in receiving lottery funding and bringing the hall to the good condition it is in today. ## WHAT LIES BENEATH – HOW LAYING A PIPE TURNED INTO A JOURNEY BACK IN TIME.

We've had our very own version of Time Team in the area for the past few months – and now we're getting the chance to find out exactly what they've uncovered.

**It all began back in May 2009, when the County Council's Historic Environmental Projects linked up with South West Water. As we all know, the company is putting in a pipeline as part of the Boscastle, Bossiney and Tintagel Waste Water Treatment Scheme which is due for completion later in the year.**

**They've made some extraordinary discoveries that prove that history is not so much right on your doorstep, but right beneath our feet. A flint working site, dating back an amazing 6000 years ago – that's a couple of thousand years before the Pharaohs ruled Egypt – was found close to a stream at Tintagel. Archaeologists call this the Mesolithic Age, when people were nomadic hunter-gatherers.**

**They also found 30 pits, probably from Neolithic times (6000 – 4500 years ago). Most contained charcoal or burnt stones but a few contained bits of broken pottery. The highlight was the discovery in a pit near Bossiney of fragments of broken bowls, 10 razor sharp flints and a beautiful flint arrow head. No-one knows what the pits were used for – some could have been used for cooking, while others might have been used for rituals.**

Elsewhere, a large stone box or cist measuring roughly 2m by 0.7m was discovered at Forrabury cliffs. It was made of large slate slabs set on edge set within a pit. Beaker pottery dating from the Early Bronze Age (4500 - 4000 years ago) was obtained from the cist fill. A second, similar structure was found in a field to the northeast of Trevalga.

from later prehistoric or early medieval times – around 2000 years ago. The graves have remained undisturbed and have been covered to ensure they're protected.

Finally, some good news. The contractors for South West Water, Bam Nuttall, say they hope to have all the main road works completed by Easter. At the end of March they'll be laying the last pipes and ducts in Atlantic Way. They will also be finishing major works at Tintagel Haven and reinstating the track down to the Castle. This will be the last part of the disruption to the road network in Tintagel for this scheme. Both South West Water and Bam Nuttall would like to thank everyone in the area for their co-operation and understanding while the work has been going on.

A prehistoric field system was uncovered in three fields to the north of Bossiney and a Bronze Age roundhouse some 8m in diameter was uncovered on a north facing hill-slope at Trevalga on the site of the Waste Water Treatment Works. This was totally excavated and is thought to date to the later part of the Bronze Age (3000 years ago).

A cemetery was also unearthed – the exact date of which remains a mystery. But the experts believe it is
